Classical Acupuncture This is theory and practice that makes greater reference to the Classical period and its texts including: Nei Jing, Nan Jing, Mai Jing. It is important to note that the classics should not be treated as infallible like sacred texts.

Constitutional Five Element Acupuncture The Five Elements are central to various approaches to acupuncture found in Japan Korea and Taiwan. Constitutional emphasizes the central idea in the teaching of J. R. Worsley of a constitutional basis. Although the same principle is also found in Korean Constitutional acupuncture there are also important differences.

Traditional Acupuncture Traditional Chinese Medicine (TCM) J. R. Worsley spoke of Traditional Acupuncture to distinguish it from modern/mainstream Traditional Chinese Medicine (TCM).

Traditional Oriental Medicine The traditional medicine (as opposed to Western Medicine) as practiced in modern China. This is arguably characterized in various ways: systematized, westernized and herbalized are all words that can be used to describe this approach, albeit in a qualified sense.

The traditional medicine of China, Korea, Taiwan, Hong Kong, Japan. That are all

predominantly derived from China, but have not been subject to the standardization of modern TCM. Although "Asian" is preferred to many rather than "Oriental" it would include Indian traditions that are distinct.

Translates as 'centre of the chest', but refers to a specific vital (energetic) center. In Chapter 8 of the Su Wen this is the name for the Xin Bao Luo/Xin Zhu (see below). The name of CV.17 although this is often referred to by its secondary name a reference to the center of the chest Xiong Tang (Chest Palace)

Xin Bao or Xin Bao Luo – translates as 'Heart Wrapping' or 'Heart Wrapping Collaterals' this is an alternate name for the Xin Zhu, Xin Bao Luo, Dan Zhong (see other entries), it is translated in modern books as Pericardium. But to identify it with the anatomical structure would be an error. Epicardium might be better.

Heart Governor or Heart Master alternate name for Xin Bao Luo, commonly used in Nan Jing. Sometimes the combined term is used.

Translated as ancestral, gathering or chest Qi. According to Porkert this has two meanings:

1. Product of Ta Qi and Gu Qi, expressing itself in the cardiac and respiratory rhythm. TCM "Chest Qi"

2. The innate capacity for the above

The first can be understood as a noun a product. The second is a dynamic process, the transformation of innate Qi to acquired Qi (hence the term ancestral).

Name given in European texts to a function that is known as Pericardium in modern texts. Circulation may be a more accurate rendering of Xin Bao Luo.
